This pamphlet explains the Oath of Canadian Citizenship. When you take the oath you are promising to be loyal to the Queen of Canada, to follow the laws of Canada and to respect your duties as a Canadian citizen.

The Oath of Citizenship

I swear (or affirm) That I will be faithful And bear true allegiance To Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second Oueen of Canada Her Heirs and Successors And that I will faithfully observe The laws of Canada And fulfil my duties as a Canadian citizen.

THE CANADIAN CROWN



Canada is a constitutional monarchy, a parliamentary democracy and a federal state. We have both a Head of State and a Head of Government.

- The Head of State is the Sovereign (the reigning King or Queen), whose powers are limited by the highest law in our land, the Constitution.
- The Head of Government is the Prime Minister, who is a Member of Parliament in the House of Commons and is responsible for the day-to-day operations of government.

The Crown is a symbol of the Queen and of the authority of governments in Canada. It is the source of the legitimate exercise of state power and of the rule of law. It can be seen in many aspects of our daily life. You will notice the Queen's image on a coin, a \$20 bill or a postage stamp, and you might even meet Her Majesty or a member of the Royal Family during one of their frequent visits to Canada.

The Sovereign is represented in Canada by the Governor General and the Lieutenant Governors. The Governor General is appointed by the Sovereign on the advice of the Prime Minister.

ALLEGIANCE TO THE QUEEN

In her coronation ceremony in 1953, the Queen took an oath of loyalty to us, her people. Our Oath of Canadian Citizenship is our promise of loyalty back to the Queen. When you take the Oath of Canadian Citizenship, you make a solemn promise to follow the laws of Canada and to perform your duties as a citizen. In return for your allegiance, the Canadian state—the Crown—guarantees to protect your rights and freedoms.

CANADIAN LAWS AND THE DUTIES OF CITIZENSHIP

Canadian citizens have rights and responsibilities. These come to us from our history, are enshrined in Canadian law and reflect our shared identity and values. Our laws secure for Canadians an 800-year old tradition of ordered liberty which dates back to the signing of the *Magna Carta* of 1215 in England (also known as the *Great Charter of Freedoms*). These historic ideals of freedom and liberty have evolved over time and are summarized in the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms*, which was added to our Constitution in 1982. These include:

- Freedom of conscience and religion;
- Freedom of thought, belief, opinion and expression, including freedom of speech and of the press;
- Freedom of peaceful assembly; and
- Freedom of association.

Your principal duties as a Canadian citizen are to obey the law, to take responsibility for yourself and your family and to respect the rights and freedoms of others. A noble expression of citizenship is to serve your country voluntarily in the navy, army or air force.
